# Tevis Cup 2023 Stories

Kong came to us at the beginning of May, about 2.5-3 months before the Tevis cup. His owner, Cameron Holtzer, was pregnant and was not going to be able to ride/race him for a while. She reached out to us and asked if we would like to campaign Kong, and offered for us to take him to the Tevis Cup. After moving our entire farm to Texas and setting up our ranch, our horses had a significant amount of time off and would not be ready for Tevis this year, so we gladly accepted Cameron's offer.

Although I had done a lot of conditioning rides with Kong, I had only done I race with him before Tevis. I was not entirely sure what to expect from him at the race, especially at the start. The morning of the race was quite cold up in the mountains and I fully expected Kong to be quite ramped up because of that.

He surprisingly was very good, he was full of energy and definitely excited for the long journey ahead, but he kept it together and stayed very focused. Kong had done this race before, 3 times to be exact, this time would be his 4th, and he was the image of total confidence.

The trek from Soda Springs to Robinson flat was mostly mountain roads with very good footing, Kong made fantastic time in the cool morning. He took such good care of himself throughout the day eating and drinking at every opportunity. He paced himself very well, moved out where it was good to move out and took it slower where it wasn't safe. I was most impressed with him going through the canyons, that is where most competitors slow down. It's constant steady down, and then immediately constant steady up, and you generally hit the canyons in the heat of the day. Kong was so strong, and set a good steady pace going down and then up, we ended up passing a few other riders through the canyons, which I was not expecting. I was very impressed with how sure footed Kong was as well. There were so many times I thought for sure he would have tripped over some rough footing, and he just floated over it like it was nothing. I felt very safe on him as we journeyed through the toughest terrain there is.

We finished 3rd overall and crossed the line just as the sun was setting, which again, I was not expecting at all. It is very common to finish the Tevis cup in the dark, even the front runners. Kong set an amazing pace all day and took such good care of himself I was so pleased with him, and he finished very strong. I thank God for this wonderful experience, I learned so much riding an experienced Tevis competitor. I also learned a lot getting to ride at the front, what it takes to be competitive at this race. I would also like to thank Cameron Holtzer for allowing me to take Kong through this amazing race, he is such a wonderful horse and this was a huge gift to me in more ways than I can describe. This is one of the toughest endurance races in the entire world, and to ride this amazing horse through it in the top 10 was an experience of a lifetime.

#### Rachel Miura and Theodore the Wonder Horse (Theo)

Theo and I had a wonderful experience riding the Tevis Cup for the first time this year! We'd been working diligently towards this goal for awhile, focusing on getting enough qualifying miles last season, and then honing our fitness, nutrition, tack, etc throughout this year. Theo felt great in the weeks leading up to it, and the weather turned out to be pretty decent (mid 80s-mid 90s), so that was a variable that didn't turn out to be too bad.

The start at Soda Springs had us camping right by an active train track, which Theo wasn't a fan of, but he made it through the night unscathed even after a few fits of bucking as each train went by! The first part of the route was different this year due to snow, which had us on a fire road for -12 miles, and I tried to rate our speed until we got to the first one-hour hold at Robinson Flat. Theo is competitive and was mad I was letting so many other teams pass us!

After Robinson Flat we got our first taste of the canyons. The descents were fine but the climbs were tough, and with recent fire damage there wasn't much shade in some sections. After we made it to the one-hour hold at Foresthill about an hour ahead of our planned schedule, we were both feeling good, and I knew that if we continued to ride smart we had a good chance of finishing. Theo seemed to get stronger and more focused as the heat of the day dissipated, and we even got kudos from the vet at the Francisco's checkpoint about how great he was looking!

We rode with two other teams through the darkness and ended up making it to the timed finish line <u>at about</u> <u>3:30am</u>. When it was our turn to take our victory lap in McCann Stadium I choked up with emotion. We'd worked so hard to get to this point, and it was a surreal experience to be there, with all the months of prep, and miles of the day, now behind us! Theo vetted through well, and we ended up in 29th place out of 94 starters/61 finishers.

We feel grateful for everyone who has helped us on this journey - our coach, trainers, vet, farrier, crew, family, and friends! And we are especially feeling thankful to the Tevis Cup ride managers, vets, and volunteers who worked so hard to put the ride on. It was a dream come true to experience the trail and be part of the infamous Tevis Cup!

A lot of people have asked me "what's next?" To be honest, I am not totally sure yet what our next endurance goal will be! I share Theo with my 12 year old daughter Brynn, who wants to try out eventing with him. Theo is such a versatile horse - so athletic, brave, and smart - I am sure they will do great together, and I am excited to support them!
